

## Did you know?


In some countries, including Spain, the French **Revolution** is considered the end of Modern History and the start of Contemporary History. However, in **English-speaking countries** the period after the Revolution is still considered Modern History. In English, contemporary history refers to very recent events, which most people in the world can remember.

We know much more about this period of history than older periods. This is because there are **many more primary sources**, including:

- government documents like constitutions, laws and treaties
- diaries, letters, newspaper articles, interviews and speeches
- radio and television broadcasts
- photographs and videos
- buildings, furniture, clothing, tools and machines
- literature and art


